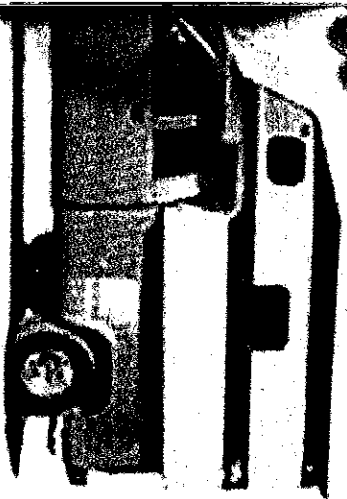


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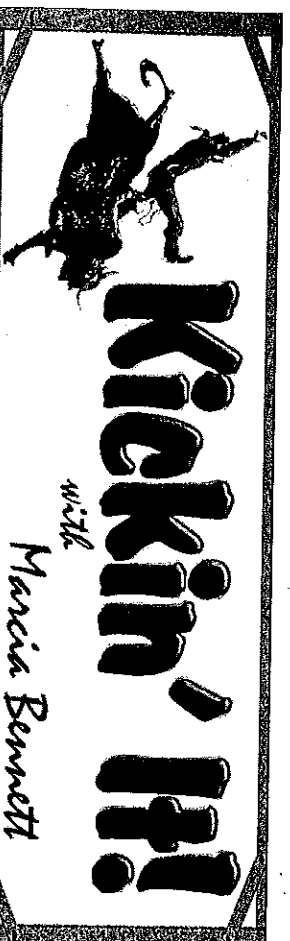
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**Clayton Williams, Professional Bull Rider**

**"Quit is not in his vocabulary!"**

Clayton Williams of Carthage, Texas, and the son of five times stock contractor of the year, Terry Williams, was destined to be a bull rider. Growing up Williams was always around bucking bulls and going to rodeos every week. He started riding sheep when he was small then moved up to calves. He took bull riding more serious when he was about 13 years old. While in school he played baseball and football and rode bulls on the weekends. During his teen years he became involved in the junior bull riding and bull riding became a number one priority to Williams. He set his goals high and received a scholarship to Panola College where he majored in economics.

Williams had many instruct and influence him on his bull riding skills as he was growing up. Norman Curry, from Carthage, Texas, was always coming by his house and giving him pointers. Owen Washburn would come by to purchase bulls and also gave young Williams pointers. Then his dad put on a bull riding school with Tuff Hedeman, 1995 PBR World Champion and young Williams attended the schools every summer. The tips from his mentors paid off as Williams captured the Texas High School Rodeo Association's bull riding title in 2004. He was the only bull rider to cover all of his bulls at the event.

Williams first pro year was with the PRCA and the CBR. In 2005 he sustained an injury at Tuff Hedeman's event in Ft. Worth, Texas, which kept him out the rest of the year. He returned in 2007 with a blaze of glory.

In his rookie year Williams made his presence known at the PBR winning the 2007 Challenger Tour Finals in Oklahoma City. He earned \$215,000 which landed him among bull riding's elite on the Built Ford Tough Series. Williams went on to clinch the 2007 PBR Daisy Rookie of the Year title. In 2008 in Oklahoma City, he defended his Challenger Tour Finals title, going home with \$524,000. Williams earned the bulk of one million dollars not once, but two years in a row. It's unbelievable a rodeo cowboy can earn that kind of money. You hear about it being done in other sports such as baseball, football and putting a golf ball.

Early in 2009, Williams had to address his elbow injury. That surgery would cause him to sit out the remainder of the 2009 season. That didn't keep Williams from returning, he is currently 10th in the standings and has decided to focus on the CBR and rodeos. The 2010 season looks promising for Williams. He has his eye on the \$100,000 bonus check at the end of the year.

We asked Williams of all the bulls currently out there, which one would he like to get on that he has not drawn yet, "I really would like to get on Big Iron of Diamond S, I really like that bull," he said. When asked which bull out there he would not like to get on, he responded, "I would have to say White Magic of Diamond G".

Williams is partners with his father in their breeding program. Their genetics includes *Panhandle Slim, 301 Sports Machine, A6, Eight Ball* and many more. Williams also plays around with the stock market from time to time. We asked Williams where he sees himself in five years and he said "I want to get into investment banking; I hope I'm not riding bulls in five years, it takes me from home, leaving my wife Kristen and of course we hope to have a family one day."

At the age of 24, Williams has had tremendous success and the future looks very promising to him. No matter what road he chooses to travel, I have a feeling Williams is going to shine in anything he does.
